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

John Fisher, who has been engaged in mining in this section for the past sixteen years, returned a few days since from a prospecting tour, after an absence of four or five months. He and one or two others left here last fall to prospect the country along the Colorado river, and after being out for some time discovered a very rich gold ledge about twenty-five miles from Ehrenberg. Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Arizona: SECTION 1. That, for the purpose of encouraging the building and construc- are after. tion of railroads within the Territory of Arisona, by any person, association or

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
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
