THE FIRST PICNIC OF OLD SETTLERS SOCIETY
Was Voted a Most Enjoyable Day. Speeches, Stories and Big Dinner.

The first Old Settlers picnic in Arizona was held yesterday at the camping grounds at the end of the Brill car line and was attended by fully 400 people. Of this number about 200 registered as Old Settlers, the requirement being that of a residence in the territory since 1858 or of twenty years. It is thought that quite a number did not remember to register and that the total might have been materially increased. Orlando Allen was the earliest pioneer present, having come to Arizona in '63, to the county in '88. J. B. Montgomery and Bill Gibson who were here in '64, were the second longest in the territory, while there were a number of others who came along about the same time and a little later.
The book revealed the names of five natives, born previous to '88. A record was kept also of the states from which the residents came, and it was shown that California either furnished the most old timers or a larger representation of Californians were there, the total being 19, as against 12 from Missouri, which stood next. Texas, Illinois, New York and Pennsylvania ranked about the same, and southerners were not as numerous as might have been supposed. There were 11 foreign-born citizens and four Canadians all of whom fulfilled the 20-year limit.
Though old settlers picnics and reunions have been frequent events in older and eastern states, yesterday's was the first of the kind in the territory. Hassayampa day at the territorial fair might be considered somewhat along the same line, though not devoted to a good old fashioned spread out-of-doors with the customary speechmaking and telling of tales of the early days. Perhaps the most enjoyable portion of the day's program was that before the dinner hour, when the pioneers gathered and unwound the yards of yarn, recounted the feat of arms who had passed and the history of their deeds, the Indian outrages, the bad man's escapades,

the conditions and scanty development seem to have been the result of difficulties which the first inhabitants encountered in home-making and community building. From ten o'clock till noon the time was devoted to this pleasant diversion.
The dinner was spread under the open air pavilion upon tables provided for that purpose, and it was pronounced by those who partook of the feast as most sumptuous and hunger-satisfying. From the many large baskets the amazing variety of good things which Salt River valley can prepare were forthcoming in quantities that left nothing to be desired, except larger storage capacity.
The crowd then assembled under the pavilion to listen to the addresses. The program was introduced by singing the favorite song for this character of meeting, Auld Lang Syne, and the choir and the audience, Rev. Cratchfield, presiding elder of the South Methodist church in Arizona was the first speaker. He indulged in reminiscences of the progress of church work in both Texas and this territory, and in the progress of the church in this territory. He described the church in Arizona as having had a hard struggle in building up the churches, not so much because of the happy-go-lucky nature of the people and the alien influences, but they were unprovided with suitable buildings for such meetings. In Phoenix and in the open air and in one place, in a hotel or any shelter that could house a small crowd, were the only available places of worship in those days. Contrasted with the conditions in those times he dwelt briefly on the progress seen all over the territory. In behalf of the church he welcomed the old settlers to the camping grounds and whatever advantages it possessed for their purpose.
Capt. Crenshaw made a fine address. He said he hardly felt like an old settler, for the reason that when he came here some 21 years ago, many of the first settlers were still living, whose knowledge and acquaintance with pioneer days antedated his own experience. Among them he recalled Capt. Hancock, C. H. Gray, Judge Tweed, and others.
He described the country as it was then, and the changes that had occurred in his residence here of nearly a quarter of a century. But its past progress was not to be compared with the future which he sincerely believed was yet to become reality. The dream of empire which the early settlers had had, was to materialize and flower as even they had never foreseen.
Col. McClintock, who came here in 1879, was the next speaker. He said the early settlers were men who went out into the arid desert with eyes of faith and won a great battle in conquering the forces of nature, and to them is due more credit than they who subdue nations by force of arms. Referring to "early scenes," he recalled his first sight of an Arizona bed-

room, a long line of cots where he was told he might find his brother. He went along and lifted each sheet to see which one was his brother, an action which Governor Kibbey later referred to as proving Col. McClintock a tenderfoot, or else that it was the deed of some other tenderfoot who had not been heard of since. The Colonel said that it took one day's wild doings with the gun play of a few to make Phoenix over from an outlaw camp into the semblance of a Sunday school session. But those days were past. With July 4th, 1887, the day when the first railroad came into Phoenix, dates the real civilization of Phoenix, and with the coming of the Santa Fe another epoch began, and with the Tonto project yet another and a greater era.
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
