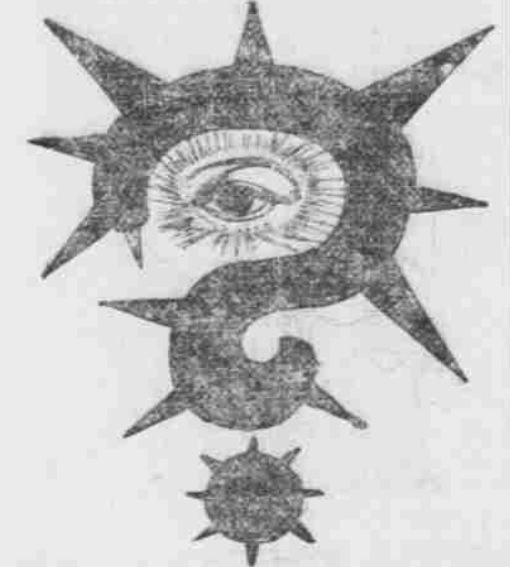
THE GOOD OLD SUMMER TIME

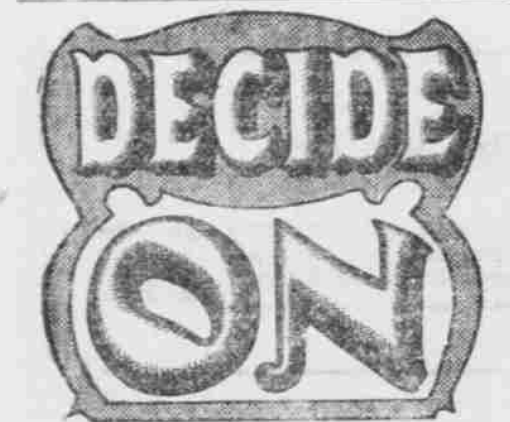

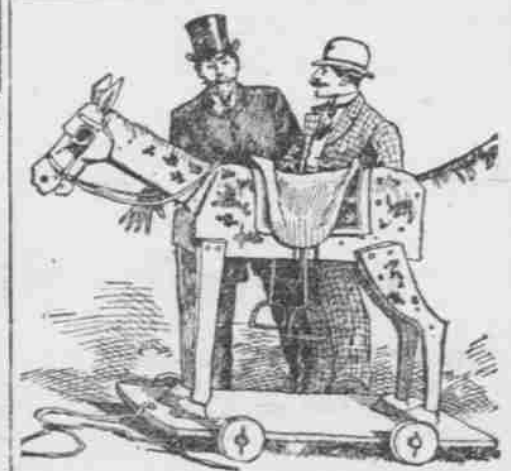

THE MIRANDA OUTBREAK—The Miranda family turned itself loose on Sunday and Sunday night. Two men of that name were before Justice Burnett, P. Miranda and Jesus Miranda. In the case of the former, who was charged with a disturbance of the peace, judgment was suspended. The latter was accused of whipping Jesus Baldenegro, a woman with whom he has been living for several years, and whom he has frequently thrashed. 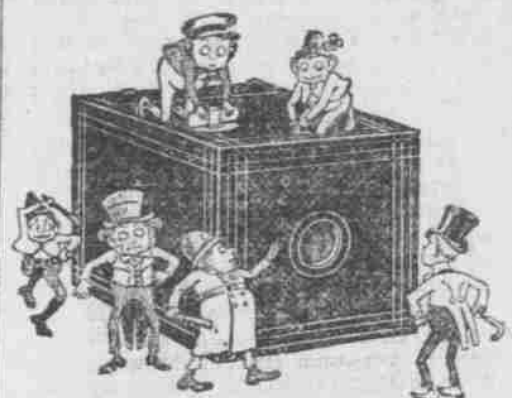

POLICE COURT—In police court yesterday Leonidas Robles and a Mrs. Graham, both of whom are leading social lights in the lower stratum of society in the lower end of town, were given seven day sentences with cash alternatives, for having wandered off their natural preserves and strayed into a saloon at Five Points. One of them made a partial cash payment. Andy Garcia was sent to jail for seven days for drunkenness, Ricardo Gonzales for five days on a similar charge and George Glover forfeited five dollars of good money for failing to answer at court time.

HE CHANGED HIS DEFENSE—Pedro Gomez, the old man who terrorized a part of the town with a revolver on Sunday, was before Justice Johnston yesterday. Every time the old man has been arrested he has begged to be let off in order that he might go to his home across the river and either plant, tend or gather his chili crop. He made the same plea for leniency yesterday when the justice, who is something of an agriculturist himself, told him that it was mid season for the chili crop and that it needed no immediate attention. Gomez said that he had spoken hastily; what he meant was his crop of sandillas which were going to waste for want of care. Mike McDonald for disturbance of the peace got five days. Data Pik, an Indian, similarly charged, got the same kind of a sentence.

A LIGHTNING STROKE—In the midst of the storm last night a thunderbolt fell near the corner of First avenue and Adams street. Spectators are not exactly agreed as to the actual point of contact. Some say that it hit a telephone pole in front of the Donofrio building and glanced off to the roof, running along the edge of it. Others were sure it was aimed directly at the paraphernalia on top of the weather bureau building. At any rate, a horse hitched midway in the block between First avenue and Washington street was knocked down. Everybody within a radius of two blocks was of the opinion that the lightning had fallen next door, for there was no appreciable space of time between the flash and the crash. After the first burst of thunder a rattling could be heard for a quarter of a minute.
