At the M. E. church, south, Sunday evening, the congregation listened with intense interest to a sermon preached by the pastor, Rev. Rowland, on the subject of "Tempe and the Sabbath." The occasion had been well advertised and the church was crowded. The sermon was just about what was expected to be and there is no question but that a great many self evident truths were advanced and put before the congregation in an emphatic manner.

After a short introduction Rev. Rowland continued the sermon in part as follows: "Does Tempe Observe the Sabbath Day to Keep it Holy? We answer most emphatically in the negative. So crowded was the train and so anxious were the people from here to go that many of them went in box cars rather than take the other alternative and remain at home. This afternoon many people from here on account of special trains and a ball game in Phoenix spent the afternoon there. A few weeks ago an excursion was run to Phoenix park to give the people of the south side an opportunity to witness the throwing of a steer by a man with his teeth, just previous to that there were cow boy events at the same place which were well patronized by residents of Tempe. Almost every Sunday notable picnic parties and baseball games are frequent. Even this afternoon there was a game here.

Stores are often open Sunday mornings and it is possible to buy a bill of dry goods on the Sabbath day as well as at any other time. The saloons are also wide open on the Sabbath day, and if anything they do a better business on the Lord's day than at any other time. Not satisfied with such desecration, we are obliged to have a fire drill on the street on Sunday afternoon. What a sight for a town and nation claiming to be Christian.
